Biography of Dr. Iburia Venetta Hall-Haynes

Dr. Iburia V. Hall-Haynes was born in Birmingham, Alabama.

Dr. Hall-Haynes is the daughter of one of the oldest members of the Leeds Community, Dr. Luvenia Hall and the late Lathus Hall, Sr.

She is married to Edwin Haynes, JD, former Director of the National Education Association's Education, and Business & Outreach Division for 36 years. She has one daughter, Edneka L. Haynes, JD and one step-son Edwin L. Haynes, II. Her siblings are: Donnie Fuller, Birmingham; Alabama; Linda Jackson, Fort Washington, MD; and Lathus Hall, Jr., Detroit Michigan. All three attended R. R. Moton High School.

Dr. Hall-Haynes graduated from R. R. Moton High School in 1968. After graduating from high school in the top 10% of her class, she enrolled in Alabama State University in Montgomery, Alabama and graduated in 1972 with a Bachelor of Science (BS) Degree in Business Education and English. She received a Master of Art (MA) Degree from Antioch University, Yellow Springs, Ohio in 1977 in Human Services Administration and Organization Development in 1977 and a Doctor of Philosophy (Ph.D.) Degree from George Mason University, Fairfax, VA in Education Leadership and Technology. She has also attended school at James Madison University, Harrisonburg, VA; the University of Virginia, Charlottesville, VA; & Longwood University in Farmville, VA.

Her categories of service are in education, community service, volunteering and administration. The nominee is currently a consultant for her company EBH & T Associates.
